#### Use of CSBG Resources

CSBG funds were used to provide space and training to support volunteer efforts of a client assigned to the agency as part of a partnership with our county felony drug court.

#### Outcome and Results

A young woman assigned to the agency for community service arrived with limited appropriate professional skills. She assisted agency staff with food pantry operations and numerous Action Angels activities. Staff modeled professional behaviors and reinforced appropriate behaviors in the work place. This individual verbalized to EOC staff and to her counselors and monitors in drug court that her work with our agency helped to her to recognize her own self worth that motivated her to establish firm education and career goals that will improve her self sufficiency moving forward.

#### Use of CSBG Resources

CSBG funds were used to provide housing assistance for a woman and her young child.

#### Outcome and Results

A woman presented at our office having recently moved out of an abusive situation. She was living with family with her young child in a living room on a blow-up mattress, having to transport her child to his school in another community. She was employed but without sufficient resources to be able to afford security and moving costs. Her emergency living situation was extremely stressful, which was impacting her ability to maintain work performance, she was arriving late, having to take days off due to the complications of her temporary living situation. CSBG funds were used to assist with first months rent on a home that for she and her child that she would be able to share with an elderly relative, making this housing affordable. Relocation into permanent housing improved her ability to maintain performance at her job and significantly improved her sense of safety and wellbeing.
